## **Rapid Access Giant Cell Arteritis Clinic**

#### What is the Fast Track Giant Cell Arteritis Clinic?

This is a new service established to streamline rapid outpatient Rheumatology and Ophthalmology assessment and management of patients with suspected Giant Cell Arteritis. The aim is to avoid unnecessary inpatient admission whilst ensuring gold standard investigation and care of these patients. It is modelled on successful European models that have demonstrated improved healthcare outcomes and cost effectiveness.

### When and where will my patient be seen?

Patients referred to the GCA Fast Track Clinic will be seen by a Rheumatology consultant within 72 hours of referral. The Clinic will be based at RPH. Temporal artery biopsy will be arranged within a week, which may occur on the same day or as a separate appointment at RPH. This will be done under local wherever possible.

### Should I start my patient on steroids?

If you have a high index of suspicion for giant cell arteritis, than early treatment with high dose oral steroids is warranted as per eTherapeutic Guidelines. In the case of any visual symptoms, urgent treatment (often with intravenous methylprednisolone) is imperative and these patients should be referred to the Emergency Department for further assessment and management. Either way this should be discussed with the Rheumatology team at RPH when making the referral as outlined above.

#### What is the study being conducted from this clinic?

As of February 2019, there is a study running to investigate the effectiveness of this new Fast Track Giant Cell Arteritis Clinic and answer other research questions about this condition. Patients will be enrolled if they consent to the use of their data for study purposes. A subgroup of study participants will be asked to undergo two PET/CT scans which is the only study-specific difference in management. *Patients will otherwise be managed in exactly the same manner whether or not they chose to participate in the study.*

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## When will my appointment be?

You are suspected of having an uncommon but serious condition called giant cell arteritis which means inflammation of blood vessels, commonly around the head and neck. You need to be seen in the Royal Perth Hospital Rapid Access Giant Cell Arteritis Clinic for further investigation and management.

## Before your appointment:

If you have been commenced on steroid medication (e.g. prednisolone) by your doctor, ensure that you take this as instructed every day.

Attend the Emergency Department if you experience *any significant visual changes.* 


#### At your appointment:

You will be seen by a Consultant Rheumatologist who will perform a thorough assessment of you, including an ultrasound scan of the blood vessels around your temples, and organise blood tests and other scans if necessary. *Please expect delays – unfortunately this is often unavoidable.*
